Community Boards

Role of community boards (s52 Local Government Act 2002)

- a) represent, and act as an advocate for, the interests of its community; and
- b) consider and report on matters referred by the council and other matters of interest
- c) maintain an overview of services provided by the council within the community; and
- d) prepare an annual submission to the council for expenditure within the community;
- e) communicate with community organisations and special interest groups within the community; and
- f) undertake any other responsibilities that are delegated to it by the territorial authority.

Addressing the community board

Requests for public forum and deputations need to be made at least one day prior to the meeting. The Chairperson has authority to approve or decline public comments and deputations in line with the standing order requirements.

Public Forum

Public Forums enable members of the public to bring matters to the attention of the committee which are not contained on the meeting agenda. The matters must relate to the meeting's terms of reference. Speakers can speak for up to 5 minutes, with no more than two speakers on behalf of one organisation.

Deputations

Deputations enable a person, group or organisation to speak to the meeting on matters contained on the agenda. An individual speaker can speak for up to 10 minutes. Where there are multiple speakers for one organisation, a total time limit of 15 minutes, for the entire deputation, applies.

Purpose of Local Government

The reports contained in this agenda address the requirements of the Local Government Act 2002 in relation to decision making. Unless otherwise stated, the recommended option outlined in each report meets the purpose of local government and:

- Promote the social, economic, environmental, and cultural well-being of communities in the present and for the future.
- Would not alter significantly the intended level of service provision for any significant activity undertaken by or on behalf of the Council, or transfer the ownership or control of a strategic asset to or from the Council.

How much should we invest in fixing our plumbing over the next 10 years? (pg 19)

Option 3 – Medium. Clear out the backlog and start making some improvements. \$140m additional funding *(NPDC's preferred option)*

How do we pay for fixing our plumbing? (pg 20)

Option B - Partially debt fund long life assets to bridge the gap.

Comments

We appreciate the investment that has been made in the Inglewood infrastructure in the past but we still want to see a priority on alleviating the backlog that is preventing growth and property development.

The Inglewood Community Board suggest that the racecourse could be moved to a more central location, such as Stratford.

WHAT ELSE?

Windsor Walkway (RD2006)

The Inglewood Community Board ask that serious consideration being given to completing this project in its entirety, as originally planned. Currently there is signage that indicates the Windsor Walkway exists but the project has never been completed.. This project has an allocation of \$120,000 allocated for year 2 and the Inglewood Community Board do not believe that this is sufficient to complete the project.

In 2020, the Inglewood Community Board sought feedback from the Inglewood Community as to the use and friendliness of the Windsor Walkway. Of the 466 responses received, 74% wanted to see improvements made to safety and accessibility along this popular walkway.

If this project cannot be completed to a safe level for all users, which includes visitors to Inglewood, then the signage needs to be removed.

Rata Street Pedestrian Crossing

The Inglewood Community Board request that the Council pursues all lines of negotiation with NZTA / Waka Kotahi with the aim of resolving the public concerns of no safe pedestrian crossing on Rata St near the Purple Diary. Council Officers have been investigating this for some time and whilst sympathetic, they struggle to get NZTA / Waka Kotahi engaged with this very public safety issue.

Shading for Jubilee Park

This park is a destination and well used park for Inglewood. With the establishment of the new mini golf it is anticipated that it will become even more popular. There is currently only one picnic table

and no shading available for users. The play equipment becomes too hot for children to use during peak times over summer.

The Community board would like to see some shading put in place over the playground and more picnic tables for playground users.

It is currently planned year 6 of the LTP, and this is unacceptable to the Inglewood Community Board and we would like to see it brought forward to Year 1.

The Moa Project is programmed for Years 1-2 and this is a community funded project that does not require any funding from Council. The Inglewood Community Board would like to see the funds proposed for this project transferred to provide shading in Jubilee Park. The Moa Project is an advocacy project only for the Inglewood Community Board.

Inglewood Pool Shading

The Inglewood Pool Shelter is important for our community. The Inglewood Community Board would like to see the funding proposed for the Elliot St Precinct in Year 6 transferred to the provision of shading over the Inglewood Pool surrounds (concourse of pool).

Motorhome Dump Station

Motorhome and Caravan Association and a private contributor have offered up to \$30k contribution. The board would like assurance that this will go ahead.

Yellow Bristle Grass

Yellow Bristle Grass is classified as a pest weed by Taranaki Regional Council. It is becoming more prevalent on our country roads. The Inglewood Community Board ask that NPDC ensure that mowing and spraying roadsides does not occur during the period when this pest weed is in seed.
